FROM THE PASTOR DESK



We celebrate Pentecost; it refers to fifty. In this case it refers to the fiftieth day after the resurrection. For Jews, the celebration ‘fifty’ coincided with the end of the barley harvest at this same time was known as the Feast of Weeks. Jews who lived within thirty miles distance of Jerusalem were obliged to go there for the feast. For us Christians though we focus on the coming of the Holy Spirit in the upper room: *“suddenly there came from the sky a noise like a strong driving wind, . . . then there appeared to them tongues as of fire . . . And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit.”* (Acts 2:2-3) This occurred fifty days after the Resurrection. **Father Charles**

PENTECOST OCCURRED ON THE LORD’S DAY – ON SUNDAY Just as the Resurrection of our Lord took place on Sunday and brought a “new creation” into being, Pentecost took place on a Sunday bringing forth the “fire” of God’s love to remake the world. Each Sunday is a “little Easter”—a celebration of the central mysteries of our faith. Each Sunday sees an outpouring of the Holy Spirit at Holy Mass to the benefit of believers.

This celebration is not a solitary, private event. Instead, we come together as the People of God, the Church, to worship with one heart and one voice. The Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) teaches that “participation in the communal celebration of the Sunday Eucharist is a testimony of belonging and of being faithful to Christ and to his Church” (CCC, no. 2182). Mass attendance is not optional for the devout Catholic individual.

Sunday Mass should be the first thing on Sunday’s schedule, not the last. We should arrive on time, prepared in mind and heart to fully participate in the Mass. Those who cannot attend because of illness or the need to care for infants or the sick deserve our prayers and special attention. How numerous can be excuses for not attending Mass – particularly during summer! Sadly, for some, recreation, yardwork, pursuit of children’s ball games and other sporting events cause them to ignore the rightful worship of our Lord. Many people will suggest that going to Sunday Mass is not necessary. In fact, regular Mass attendance of at least once-per-month is less than 40% nationwide. These folks are likely to claim that they can pray at home just as well. This has clearly been an issue in the Church for more than a millennium. In the fourth century, Saint John Chrysostom wrote: *“You cannot pray at home as at church, where there is a great multitude, where exclamations are cried out to God as from one great heart, and where there is something more: the union of minds, the accord of souls, the bond of charity, the prayers of the priests.”* (CCC 2179) Now private prayer, though essential to the spiritual life, can never replace the celebration of the Eucharistic Liturgy and the reception of Holy Communion.



Sunday has traditionally been a day of rest. However, the concept of a day of rest may seem odd in a world that runs 24/7, where we are tethered to our jobs by a variety of electronic gadgets, where businesses run as normal no matter what the day of the week, and where silence seems to be an endangered species. By taking a day each week to rest in the Lord, we provide a living example to the culture that all time belongs to God and that people are more important than things.



Yet not everyone has the freedom to take Sundays away from work. Some people, including medical professionals and public safety workers, must work on Sundays to keep the rest of us safe and healthy. Others must work for economic reasons beyond their control. Resting on Sunday does not mean that we are inactive. Instead, Christians will also sanctify Sunday by devoting time and care to their families and relatives, often difficult to do on other days of the week. Sunday is a time for reflection, silence, cultivation of the mind, and meditation which furthers the growth of the Christian interior life. (CCC 2186)

God rested on the seventh day from all the work he had undertaken” (Genesis 2:2) – remember, we are made in the image and likeness of God, so we rest too. Listed below is what the Church recommends for us in keeping the Lord’s Day holy:

- ✦ Do not use Sunday as your catch-all day for errands and household chores.
- ✦ Share a family dinner after Mass. Have the whole family join in the preparation and cleanup.
- ✦ Go for a walk or bike ride and give thanks to God for the beauty of nature.
- ✦ Spend time reading the Bible or a spiritual book.
- ✦ Pray the Rosary or the Liturgy of the Hours, alone or with others.
- ✦ Visit parishioners and others who are homebound.
- ✦ Read Bible stories to your children.
- ✦ Turn off your gadgets and enjoy the silence.

Celebramos Pentecostés; se refiere a cincuenta. En este caso se refiere al quincuagésimo día después de la resurrección. Para los judíos, la celebración de los 'cincuenta' coincidía con el final de la cosecha de cebada en este mismo momento se conocía como la Fiesta de las Semanas. Los judíos que vivían a menos de treinta millas de Jerusalén estaban obligados a ir allí para la fiesta. Para nosotros, los cristianos, sin embargo, nos centramos en la venida del Espíritu Santo en el aposento alto: *"De repente vino del cielo un ruido como un viento fuerte que soplabá, . . . luego se les aparecieron lenguas como de fuego . . . Y todos quedaron llenos del Espíritu Santo"* (Hechos 2:2-3). Esto ocurrió cincuenta días después de la Resurrección. **Padre Carlos**



PENTECOSTÉS OCURRIÓ EL DOMINGO, EL DÍA DEL SEÑOR Así como la Resurrección de nuestro Señor tuvo lugar el domingo y trajo consigo una "nueva

creación", Pentecostés tuvo lugar un domingo, provocando el "fuego" del amor de Dios para rehacer el mundo. Cada domingo es una "pequeña Pascua", una celebración de los misterios centrales de nuestra fe. Cada domingo se ve una efusión del Espíritu Santo en la Santa Misa para beneficio de los creyentes. Esta celebración no es un evento solitario y privado. En cambio, nos reunimos como Pueblo de Dios, la Iglesia, para adorar con un solo corazón y una sola voz. El Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica (CIC) enseña que "la participación en la celebración comunitaria de la Eucaristía dominical es un testimonio de pertenencia y de fidelidad a Cristo y a su Iglesia" (CIC, no. 2182). La asistencia a misa no es opcional para el católico devoto.

La misa dominical debería ser lo primero en la agenda dominical, no lo último. Debemos llegar puntuales,

preparados de mente y corazón para participar plenamente en la misa. Quienes no pueden asistir por enfermedad o por la necesidad de cuidar a bebés o enfermos merecen nuestras oraciones y atención especial. ¡Cuántas excusas hay para no asistir a misa, sobre todo en verano! Lamentablemente, para algunos, la recreación, las tareas del jardín, la participación en juegos infantiles y otros eventos deportivos les hacen ignorar la verdadera adoración a nuestro Señor. Mucha gente sugerirá que ir a misa dominical no es necesario. De hecho, la asistencia regular a misa, al menos una vez al mes, es inferior al 40% en todo el país. Es probable que estas personas afirmen que pueden rezar en casa igual de



bien. Esto ha sido claramente un problema en la Iglesia durante más de un milenio. En el siglo IV, san Juan Crisóstomo escribió: *«No se puede orar en casa como en la iglesia, donde hay una gran multitud, donde se grita a Dios como desde un solo gran corazón, y donde hay algo más: la unión de los espíritus, la concordia de las almas, el vínculo de la caridad, las oraciones de los sacerdotes»* (CIC 2179). Ahora bien, la oración privada, aunque esencial para la vida espiritual, nunca puede sustituir la celebración de la liturgia eucarística y la recepción de la sagrada Comunión.



El domingo ha sido tradicionalmente un día de descanso. Sin embargo, el concepto de un día de descanso puede parecer extraño en un mundo que funciona las 24 horas del día, los 7 días de la semana, donde estamos atados a nuestros trabajos por una variedad de dispositivos electrónicos, donde los negocios funcionan con normalidad sin importar el día de la semana, y donde el silencio parece estar en peligro de extinción. Al tomar un día a la semana para descansar en el Señor, damos un ejemplo vivo a la cultura de que todo el tiempo pertenece a Dios y que las personas son más importantes que las cosas.

Sin embargo, no todos tienen la libertad de tomarse el domingo libre del trabajo. Algunas personas, incluyendo profesionales médicos y trabajadores de seguridad pública, deben trabajar los domingos para mantenernos seguros y saludables. Otros deben trabajar por razones económicas que escapan a su control. Descansar el domingo no significa que estemos inactivos. Al contrario, los cristianos también santificarán el domingo dedicando tiempo y cuidado a sus familias y parientes, algo a menudo difícil de hacer en otros días de la semana. El domingo es un tiempo para la reflexión, el silencio, el cultivo de la mente y la meditación que fomenta el crecimiento de la vida interior cristiana. (CIC 2186)

Dios descansó el séptimo día de toda la obra que había emprendido (Génesis 2:2). Recuerden, estamos hechos a imagen y semejanza de Dios, así que también descansamos. A continuación, se enumeran las recomendaciones de la Iglesia para santificar el Día del Señor:

- ◆ No uses el domingo como tu día libre para hacer recados y tareas del hogar.
- ◆ Comparte una cena familiar después de misa. Invita a toda la familia a participar en la preparación y la limpieza.
- ◆ Sal a caminar o a andar en bicicleta y da gracias a Dios por la belleza de la naturaleza.
- ◆ Dedica tiempo a leer la Biblia o un libro espiritual.
- ◆ Reza el Rosario o la Liturgia de las Horas, solo o acompañado.
- ◆ Visita a los feligreses y a otras personas confinadas en casa.
- ◆ Lee historias de la Biblia a tus hijos.
- ◆ Apaga tus dispositivos electrónicos y disfruta del silencio.


